Junkins, 67, mayor of Bridgeport for 22 years, died today after a long illness. Junkins was a brother-in-law of both W. T. Graham and John A. A. Junkins, short stop, born and raised at Bridgeport, Ohio; first seeing the light of day May 20th, 1855; was educated at the Western Reserve College and at Athens College, but left about three months before graduating. First played ball at Hudson with the college nine. Started out as a professional player in 1875 with the Neshannocks, of New Castle; has since played with the Alleghaneys in 1876 and with the Rochesterers in 1877. Gave up the business then until this year, when he opened with the Red Stockings of Kansas City. Joined the Westerns in the latter part of June. Always played third base and had the best record in 1876 of any young player in the country.</p>
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
