He caught for Leary while both men were connected with the Eries, and warm work is expected when these men meet the Rochesters on the Lynn grounds Saturday.</p>	<p>New-York Mercury Sat, Oct 06, 1877 - Page 7</p> <p>DISBANDMENT OF THE LIVE OAKS.</p> <p>The Lynn Live Oaks, after a checkered and zigzag course, disbanded per order of the directors, Saturday evening, Sept. 15, and for the balance of this season, at least Lynn will have no baseball nine, although the grounds are open to all clubs who wish to play. The nine was managed at first by twenty stockholders, who put in \$50 apiece but by the time half the season was over, six stockholders withdrew by paying \$100 apiece, and the remaining fourteen have had to go pretty deep into their pockets to meet the expenses of the team. It is estimated that after "paying up" the stockholders will be \$5 000 out. It is said that Brackett, who has managed teams in Lynn, and organized the Auburns of this year, will run one in Lynn next season. Adams has received an offer from the Rhode Islands to play with them, which he has not made up his mind to accept, but probably will. Butler has gone to pitch for the Hollistones and Allen will go with the Manchesters; Thompson will go home to Brooklyn and play with a home nine; Hawkes will probably give up baseball for this season; Leary, Fogarty, Sully, Mason and Tierney have formed no definite plans for the season.</p>
