Calbert started the season with Terre Haute. He joined Steubenville in early June, and was with Steubenville until the Interstate League collapsed. He played one game with Kansas City in Pittsburgh on July 17, the day after Sapp, Montgomery and Watson (also from Steubenville) joined Pittsburgh in Pittsburgh. The day after that (July 18) he joined Huntington when they played in Portsmouth, OH.

While there is no direct proof that Calbert with KC was Ernest Calbert, the timing fits with the collapse of Steubenville and the appearance of the other Steubenville players in Pittsburgh.
