# Little Stories of the Diamond--No. 2

Tim Callahan, who will be back in Akron's outfield again next season, is very youthful in appearance; so much so, in fact, that his admirers in the two-bit row always address him as "kid" when he comes to bat. Yet the little Irishman has gained that for which every ball players strives—a chance in the big leagues. He jumped into major league company a bashful youth, afraid to hear his own voice in the dark. He came out a day or so later with an even greater amount of timidity in his makeup.

It was several years ago that James, or Tim, as he is better known to local fandom, was recommended to "Muggsy" McGraw, manager of the New York Nationals. The latter was short on outfielders, and as it was right in the middle of the season and just before the Giants were to begin a hard series with Chicago, he picked "Cal" up.

Played at Cicago.

The young fellow was taken to Chicago and played in the first game against the Cubs. He was st floned in right garden. When the respective lineups of the two teams appeared on the scoreboard, Tim discovered for the first time that he led off for the Giants. He managed to draw four bad ones from the pitcher and trotted down to first with all the coolness of an old timer. It was right there, while he was standing on the bag, that Tim received the thrust which resulted in the brevity of his big league career. One of the players happened upon a nickname for the little Irishman which, although it suited him to a T. was not at all liked by Callahan. He was out on the first base coaching line on this particular afternoon and he made free use of Tim's new handle, much to "Cal's" discomfiture, and Tim became so rattled that he blundered badly in his attempt to steal second and was caught a yard away from the

The other players, most of whom delight in annoying a youngster as much as possible, got wise, and for hardly five minutes at a time during the remainder of the game was Callahan left in peace. His retiring disposition made it impossible for him to stand for it, and for an hour and a half on that day Tim was the most uncomfortable mortal in the state of Illinois.

Tim Leaves.

Back to the botel went the youngster after the game and up to his room. He didn't want to be disturbed and nobody offered to sympathize with him, so he finally turned in and went to sleep. When the other players began to stir around at 8 o'clock the next morning there was no sign of Callahan, and a bellboy, when dis-


