Gun Wound Fatal To George Carman

Played in Pro Baseball Leagues
And on Postum Team.

George W. Carman, 57, of 416 Woodland Beach drive, Beadle lake, a former professional baseball player and a member of the Post Cereals team from 1926 to 1936, died at 4:15 a. m. today in a local hospital.

Mr. Carman had been in critical condition at the hospital since Friday with neck and face wounds caused by the discharge of a 16-gauge shotgun at his home. Under-sheriff Ray Purcell said the wound was self-inflicted.

Played Professional Ball

Before coming to Post Cereals Mr. Carman played with clubs in the Michigan-Ontario and the Three Eye leagues.

A southpaw pitcher, Mr. Carman was better known as "Lefty" and although small in stature, was among the most effective members of Post Cereals staff which included such pitchers as Carroll Grimm, who managed the team, the late "Lefty" MacDonald and Elmer Miller who later played with the Philadelphia Phillies.

At Post Cereals Mr. Carman was employed as a painter and only a few weeks ago received his 25-year membership pin for length of employment with the company.

World War Vet

A veteran of the First World war, he was a member of the Gen. George A. Custer American Legion post. He also belonged to the First Presbyterian church.

Mr. Carman was born Feb. 22, 1893, in Manchester, Mo., son of Otis and Lucinda Carman. He married Ruth E. Watson Aug. 23, 1920, in London, Ont., and came to Battle Creek about 25 years ago.

Survivors are his wife; one niece, Mrs. Benton Hargis of Battle Creek; one brother, Luther Carman of St. Louis, Mo.; and several cousins.
