The terms of the contract, although an increase over the figures paid him last season, are not satisfactory to the youngster. He has written Manager Barrow stating that he believes he will be of service to the club this year and win a much larger percentage of the games than last season, and, although not a veteran, he is confident he will be able to hold his own in the American Association with such a team as has been picked to play behind him.

Fisher will do the coaching at Wabash College this spring. He says he has already begun gymnasium work, and is sitting himself to play fast ball from the

One of the things that stands out boldly in a perusal of the O. & P. averages is the very fine record made by Johnny Fisher, the local pitcher.
