U. S. LEAGUE READY FOR PLAY.

Manager Niesen and Chicago Team Depart Tonight for Cincinnati for Tomorrow's Opening.

Manager W. C. Niesen and his team of United States leaguers will leave tonight at 10 o'clock for Cincinnati to open the season there tomorrow.
