FOX LAKE—Walter P. Ginther, 54, Fox Lake, died at his home, Friday after a heart attack.

Funeral services will be held at 9 a. m. Tuesday in St. Mary's church, the Rev. Hugo J. Koester officiating. Burial will be in St. Mary's cemetery.

Surviving are his wife; one son, Lieut. Robert G. W. Ginther, a navy fighter plane pilot in the Pacific area, and two daughters, Dorothy A. and Helen Marie.

Mr. Ginther was a veteran of World War I, and a member of John E. Miller American Legion post at Beaver Dam. For 18 years, he has been superintendent of the Fox Lake branch of Central Canned Cakes, Inc.
