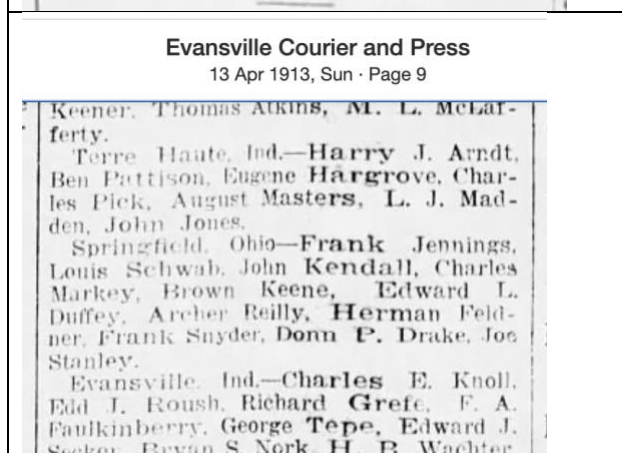
Back with Zanesville for spring 1912
