BOB KAHL, FORMERLY  
of FED TEAM, IS DEAD

Bob Kahl, who played second base for the St. Louis Federals when Jack O'Connor was manager, died at his home in Coulterville, Ill., yesterday, according to word received by his sister, Mrs. Gus H. Eckert, 2554 North Grand avenue. Heart disease was the cause of death.

Kahl was a brother of Nick Kahl, who was with the Cleveland team several years ago. Bob Kahl also played with the Hutchinson and Topeka, Kan., teams. Since retiring from baseball, he has been superintendent of a mine at Coulterville. The funeral will probably take place tomorrow.
