'Roy' Kirby, 78, Willoughby, Dies

C. L. "Roy" Kirby, 78, co-owner and manager of the Willoughby Lounge and Bar, died yesterday at West End Hospital after a lingering illness.

Born Dec. 12, 1888, in Perryville, he had lived in Willoughby since 1907. He made his home at 38130 Barber Ave.

For many years, Kirby was one of the outstanding amateur and semi-professional baseball players in the Cleveland area. He started with the Willoughby team as a shortstop, and then played for the City League in Cleveland.

He also played for the Telling Strollers, a Triple-A team, which in 1914 won a world's championship before a crowd of 93,000 at Brookside Stadium.

In 1928, he became the assistant manager of the Willoughby Theater and in 1941 was named manager of the Roller Bowl recreation center on Euclid Ave.

He was preceded in death by his sister, Ethel Fowler, and his wife Blanche who died in December, 1962.

Surviving is his daughter, Mrs. Merlyn (Jane) Parker of Willoughby.

Friends may call today, 7 to 9 p.m. and tomorrow, 2 to 4 and 7 to 9 p.m., at the Davis Funeral Home, 4154 Clark St., Willoughby.
