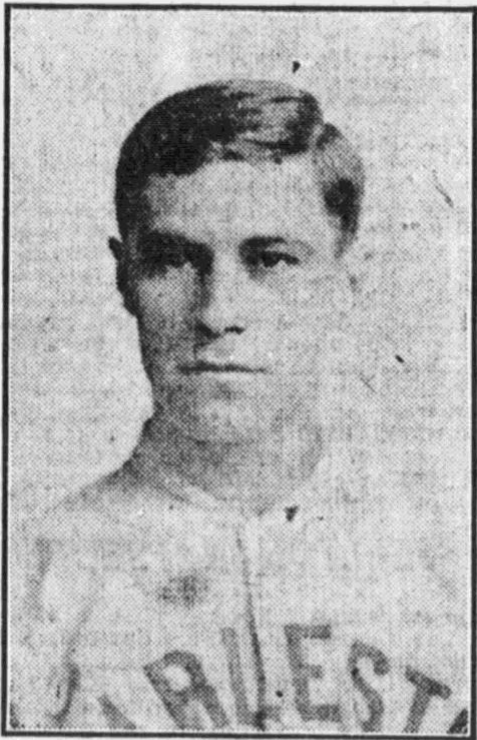

Sunbury, Pa., Sept. 18.—Masser Mackert, son of Phillip Mackert, a Sunbury merchant, returned to-day from Charleston, S. C., where he played left field with the South Atlantic League baseball team, and finished second.

Mackert batted .292 and fielded .887 during the season. He is a former member of the Susquehanna League, and played a star game with the Danville team. Last year he was signed with the Chicago Federals, but was sent to Charleston because of too many players having been signed.

Mackert has an offer to play with one of the Tri-State League teams next year. He is also a crack motorcyclist.

"MOSS" MACKERT DIES AT SUNBURY

Passenger Brakeman on the Williamsport Division Was Also a Baseball Star

F. Masser Mackert, passenger brakeman on the Williamsport Division of the Pennsylvania Railroad, died yesterday at the Mary Packer Hospital, Sunbury, following an operation for stomach trouble. He was a lifelong resident of Sunbury. "Moss" Mackert, as he was better known, was widely known in baseball circles, and played in Harrisburg frequently. He had been suffering with stomach trouble for some time, and it is the belief an injury received while playing baseball was a factor.

Baseball Star

Mackert started his career with the Federal League, was an outfielder and a star. He played with Danville in the old Susquehanna League under Manager Simon Hoffman. He then went to Hanover of the Blue Ridge League, thence to Youngstown, Ohio, where he was a teammate of the great Everett Scott in the Ohio State League. His next post was with Charleston, S. C., in
