### Quiesser Signs Up.

Danville, Ill., Jan. 29.—Art Quiesser has been signed. His name is the first to go on the salary roll of the local club. Art attached his signature to a contract to do the catching, or the bulk of it, for the Speakers and will be used to bolster up the pitching staff, having developed nine classy throwers since he broke into the game in 1904. He will also be a valuable man in the hitting department, swatting the sphere for an average of .313 last year and for a grand average of .279 for eight years.

Quiesser broke into the game with the Ft. Worth club in 1904. He was grabbed by Indianapolis in 1905 and remained there until July when he was sent to Guthrie, Okla. He was

The Reserves have an open date July 4, and are ready to book with any independent team in the state.
