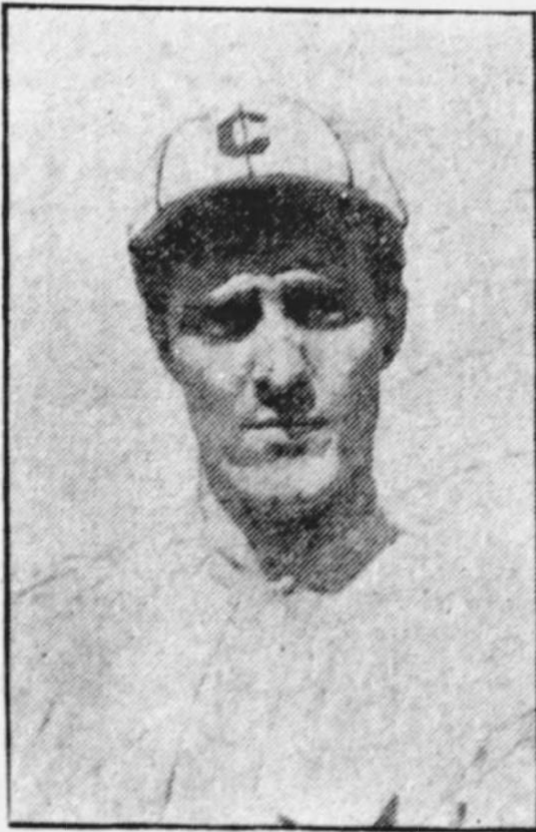


## Jack Ridgway (Mullen)
