Lynch, a former team-mate of Ryan's, manages the Green Bay club. This will be Ryan's first year in the minor leagues.

His career as a pitcher began in 1909 when he played with the St. Ignatius College club. His work that year attracted the attention of Frank McNichols, owner of the Chicago West Ends, with the result he wore a West End uniform in 1910. He played semi-pro ball until this year.

There is no reason why this youngster cannot make good in the minors, as he has a good arm, speed and a wonderful curve ball. He had several chances to sign with the minor leagues in the last two years, but thought he hadn't enough experience. This year he says he is ready.

A week later, on April 24, the College was given a two-fold cause for rejoicing, first by presenting Central Y. M. C. A. with the short end of a 3 to 1 score, and secondly by uncovering a star twirler in Jack Ryan. It was Ryan's first appearance on the rubber for S. I. C., and he made good with a vengeance, letting the Loop men down with three scattered hits and lifting seven scalps on strikes. The game was hard fought and in doubt until the eighth, when the varsity put two runs across. Central made a desperate effort to tie it up in the ninth but failed even to score. One runner was hit by a batted ball, another Merkled and Ryan calmly disposed of the last man up, making the total:

As both are "sluggers" and superb fielders, they will alternate between the outfield and the rubber, since too valuable men to be kept out of the game. Cudihy, a newly-arrived senior from Creighton U., will most likely be the third regular and a most welcome addition to the twirlers' roster. Two newcomers to varsity activities, Zelezinski and Benz, are making a decidedly favorable impression and striving for berths in this exclusive circle. Both are good
