Manager O'Connor sent in Fry, who was succeeded by Fisher in the fifth. Manager Leever started out with Sandford. The big southpaw was touched up for 15 bits and was succeeded in the seventh inning by Henning, who allowed the visitors four hits in the last three inning. A swatfest took place in the sixth, when Hohnhorst beat out an infield hit and took third on Kemplin's wallop to center. Stiss walked, filling the bases, with no one out. Miller singled, scoring, Hohnhorst and Kemplin. Stiss moved to third on the play. Watters

O'Conner's bunch had the'r batting eyes with them and hit the ball on the nose at the right


The management expects a large crowd to-day. To-morrow the boys will rest.

Fisher had steam behind his winders. Covington found him a bard man to hit.


Henning, a find of Leexer's, and who releved Saniford in the sixth, is a big fellow, and with plenty of work will surely make good.




