At the Covington Park.

St. Louis Team Rolled Up Sixteen Tallies and Easily Defeated Sam Leever's Lads.

Six hundred fans turned out to see the second game between the Covington and St. Louis teams of the Federal League yesterday at the Covington Park. The weather was clear, but the cool air soon got on the nerves of the crowd as they sat through a long and rather poorly played game. The visitors romped off with a victory, 16 to 7.

Manager O'Connor sent in Fry, who was succeeded by Fisher in the fifth. Manager Leever started out with Sandford. The big southpaw was touched up for 15 hits and was succeeded in the seventh inning by Henning, who allowed the visitors four hits in the last three innings. A swatfest took place in the sixth, when Hohnhorst beat out an infield hit and took third on Kempin's wallop to center. Stiss walked, filling the bases, with no one out. Miller singled, scoring Hohnhorst and Kempin. Stiss moved to third on the play. Watters hit to left, scoring Stiss. Pettitt hit to center, scoring Miller. Fry sacrificed. Ragsdale to Badel, Watters and Pettitt advancing. On Reggy's error of Bartin's tap, Watters scored. Prout went out. Exeter to Badel, Pettitt scoring. Hohnhorst, up for the second time, grounded out. Emery to Badel.

In the fourth Covington got busy. A two-bagger by Thoss, followed by singles by Chapman and Badel, after Exeter got hit by one of Fry's slants, enabled the home boys to secure two runs.

In the fifth St. Louis again found Sandford an easy mark and piled up three more runs. In the Covington's half after Ragsdale's walk and Emery clouted to center, Manager O'Connor put in Fisher. Kempin dropped Thoss's fly to center, Ragsdale scoring. With two men on base, Fisher struck out Sandford and Exeter. In the sixth the Mound City boys secured three more runs.

Henning went to the mound in the seventh and held St. Louis down to four hits and one run in the last three innings. All that the Kentuckians could get was one more in the seventh.

Several changes were made in the line-up during the game and very little of the snappy playing to which the fans were treated on opening day was in evidence. The unevenness of the diamond also played a part in making the game a little ragged.

Sandford has a good spitter, but is wild.

"Chic" Waters, Covington boy, played right for St. Louis and got in with a timely bingle.

Badel is always in the game, and when he stole second after a desperate slide he was given the glad hand.

O'Connor's bunch had their batting eyes with them and hit the ball on the nose at the right time.

The management expects a large crowd to-day. To-morrow the boys will rest.

Fisher had steam behind his winders. Covington found him a hard man to hit.

Henning, a find of Leever's, and who relieved Sandford in the sixth, is a big fellow, and with plenty of work will surely make good.

Emery had two errors, but at that played a pretty good fielding game. He made a fine one-handed catch off Jimmy Barton's bat, keeping St. Louis from scoring more runs than they did.

Hard Hitting Gives St. Louis Feder- als Another Victory Over Covington Team.

In a slow and rather uninteresting game the Covington Federal League team went down to defeat before St. Louis yesterday. The score was 11 to 8. The Mound City lads took three out of a series of four. Walter Justus, who was so effective in the opening contest last week got a sound wallop. Three hits, an error and a wild throw in the third netted the visitors three runs. Covington rallied in the fifth; Beebe, who had been selected to twirl for St. Louis, became wild and passed four men. Arbeiter took the mound and issued three more walks. Hits by Badel and Hicks netted the home boys six runs. Gwynn succeeded in retiring the side without any more damage. One more in the ninth was all the home boys could get, while the visitors were able to pile up six juicy runs through the hard hitting of Hohnhorst, Watters and Barton.

Considerable excitement occurred in the eighth when Umpire Wilson ordered Manager O'Connor off the grounds. Some hot words were used by the St. Louis leader following the umpire's decision in calling Stiss out for cutting third base. O'Connor refused to go until Wilson appealed to the police.

Six hundred fans were out. At the conclusion of the first series the management is satisfied with the interest that has been shown by the Covington fans. Manager Leever has several new pitchers in view and will spring a surprise on the local fans during the Chicago games, which start at the Covington Park tomorrow.
