A native of Statesville, Cooper was a son of Mrs. Bertha Drake Cooper and the late William M. Cooper. He was educated at Washington and Lee University and at Trinity College, now Duke University. He played professional ball for several years with the Baltimore Orioles. During the First World War he served as sergeant in the U. S. Marines, and was a member of the American Legion. He was never married.
