
Sketch of Richard J. Knox, the Clever Second Baseman of the Charleston Club—Notes and Comments Relative to the National Game.

much was coming to him.


"I'll find out all in good time," he explained, patiently. "There isn't, any rush about it and I'm not worrying. Yes, of course I will be glad to get it."
