Blanchard's Crooks Entirely too
Puzzling for the Eclipses.

The base ball enthusiasts who witnessed the game last Sunday, between the STARS and ECLIPSES, were given quiet a treat. The STARS came off victorious by score of 9 to 5. The game was interesting throughout, up to the seventh inning the score standing 3 to 1. The features of the game were Blanchard's work in the box, Meyers' catching and McCabe's playing at short. Blanchard struck out 15 of the ECLIPSES and did not allow them to make but one hit off his delivery while the STARS succeeded in making five singles off Hagan and Chester. Topeka Daily Commonwealth Aug 13, 1886

Notwithstanding the several difficulties under which the Topeka base ball club labored, they defeated the Western league champions yesterday afternoon in one of the most exciting games which has been seen in Topeka, or any other city, this year.

On account of the indisposition of Bauer, the home club was compelled to present Blanchard, a St. Marys, Kan., amateur, in the box. But little was known of him, and it was with a great deal of doubt that the boys went into the field. However, Blanchard soon dispelled all fears, for it was shortly demonstrated that he was perfectly at home in the box, and not only this, but he was a puzzle which the Denvers would

as best they might. But the Topeka boys did not despair. They went into the contest to do their level best and were equal to the emergency. Blanchard, an amateur pitcher from St. Marys, was put into the box, with staid, reliable, old Kenyon to support him. From the very start it was quite evident that the game would be fierce and exciting and every step closely contested.

Topeka Daily Press Aug 16, 1886

The Wichita team is made up of Topeka players for last year's western league team and one or two from the Emporia team. Whitehead, who played 3rd base for Topeka, will be manager. "Mikado" Flynn, Blanchard, Smith and Ellsworth Hickman and B. F. and F. P. Sullivan will be members of the Wichita team.

Topeka State Journal Nov 19, 1886

Chas. Blanchard, the well known ball player, passed through the city, on his way to Armourdale, Kansas, last Saturday afternoon. After leaving this city last summer, Blanchard went to Armourdale, where he signed with the Beaton club. He has signed with the same club for this season. When not playing ball he works in a blacksmith shop.

St. Mary's Star Feb 16, 1888

Blanchard occupied the points for the visitors and held the Hutchinson team down to four hits. He is very speedy and has innumerable curves. He pitched for the Topeka league club two years ago and ranked with the best.
