The St. Louis Browns will be here on that date, and will meet the new home team. The Union Club is complete, and it contains some good material. Golden and Griffin will have places in the nine. Both are from Rockford. Cady, of Chicago, Decker, and Allen are also among the men engaged. Manager McKee is confident that he has secured a strong combination. The St. Louis club will probably find out in short order whether there is "sand" in the new organization. The Metropolitans, the Grand Rapids, the Louisvilles, the Cincinnati's, and all the clubs in the Northwestern and American Associations will play here during the season. It seems to be taken for granted that Chicago can and will support two first-class base-ball clubs.
