The Omaha Team.

Secretary Worley, of the Omaha club, speaks highly of the prospects there for base ball next season, and has the following to say in regard to their next season's team:

We are especially strong in the box with Lovett, Burdick, Flynn and Cassian. I consider Lovett second to no pitcher in the Association, while if Flynn has recovered the use of his arm, as he thinks he has, he will make a very effective pitcher for us. Flynn is not only a fine pitcher, but is a great hitter. Our team is in a great measure made up from the champlon Oshkosh team of 1887. Our infield will be O'Connell, first base; Miller, second base; Doran, third base and Walsh, shortstop. In the outfield we will have Burns, left field; Annis, (of last year's Newarks) center field; Messitt, right field, with Campana as a substitute. In looking over the Western Association teams, I think that Des Moines, Kansas City, St. Paul and Omaha are the strongest, but there will not be a really weak team in the Association. We are anxious for the season to begin, and anticipate a great contest for the pennant.

The attendance at Lake Manawa was estimated from fifteen to twenty thousand. At Lake Manawa hotel 150 guests were served with dinner. The Hardins of Omaha and the Council Bluffs, team played in the afternoon, the Hardins winning by a score of 16 to 9. Cassian, of the Omahas, pitched for Council Bluffs, and the opinion is freely expressed that he sold the game. The motor line kept its cars running during the day and enjoyed excellent patronage.

"Phenomenal" Smith and Pitcher Schultze were released by the Philadelphia Club yesterday, because Manager Wright can not use them.
