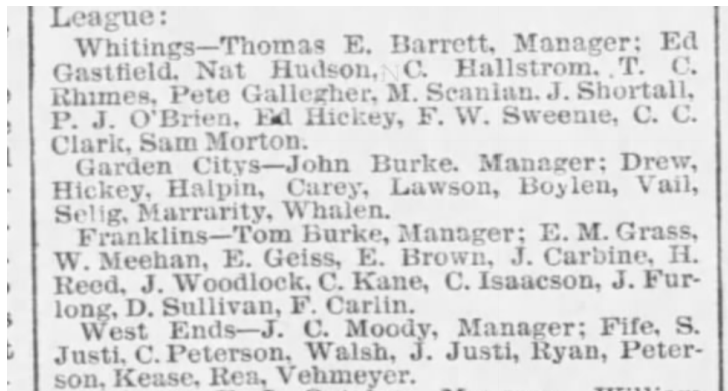

The fielding honors were about even, the first basemen of both nines doing splendid work, as did Finn, whose two errors were made in succession in the first inning, but he afterwards settled down to good work. J. J. HALPIN IS EXONERATED.

Man Discharged from Detective Force Is Reinstated by the Trial Board.

Former Detective John J. Halpin, who was dismissed from the Police department two years ago, was yesterday notified he had been exonerated by a finding of last week's Trial board and that his old place was open to him.

The order reinstating Halpin is in the form of a resolution signed by all the members of the Trial board. It expresses belief a great injustice was done Halpin when he was dismissed from the police force and regret that justice was not done him sooner. The resolution pays the ex-officer the compliment of calling him one of the most efficient detectives that ever worked for the city.

Halpin was discharged from the force for the alleged acceptance of a bribe of \$2 from a youth of the name of Ryan, now serving a sentence in Pontiac Reform School.

John J. Halpin was born in Chicago fifty-four years ago. When 16 years old he began work for an express company, and on April 2, 1892, when he was 25, he became a patrolman.

In 1894 he was made a detective sergeant at headquarters, but a change of administration a year later reduced him again to a patrolman. In 1895 he was dismissed from the service, but he re-entered it by the civil service route in 1897. From that time he rose gradually until he was made chief of detectives on May 22, 1911.

He held that post until he was suspended in October of last year by Mayor Harrison at the request of State's Attorney Hoyne.

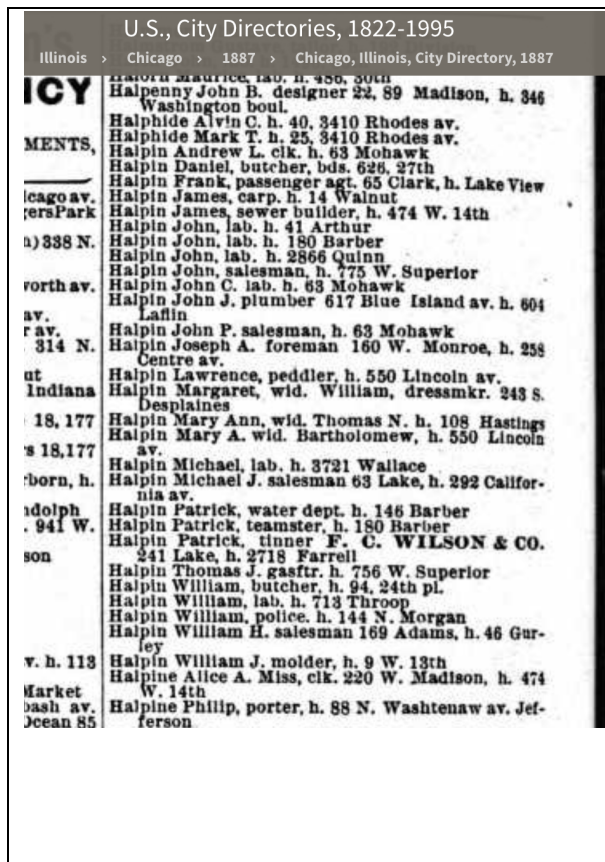

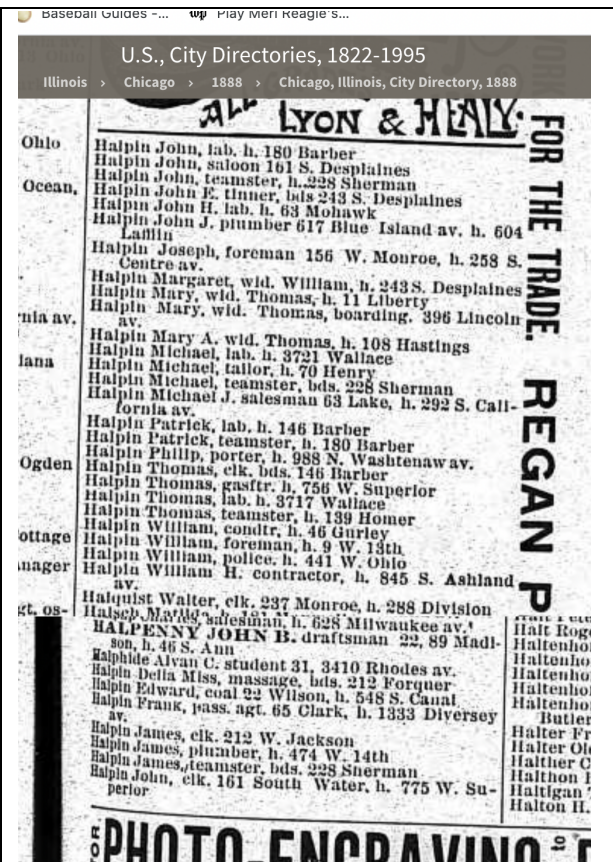

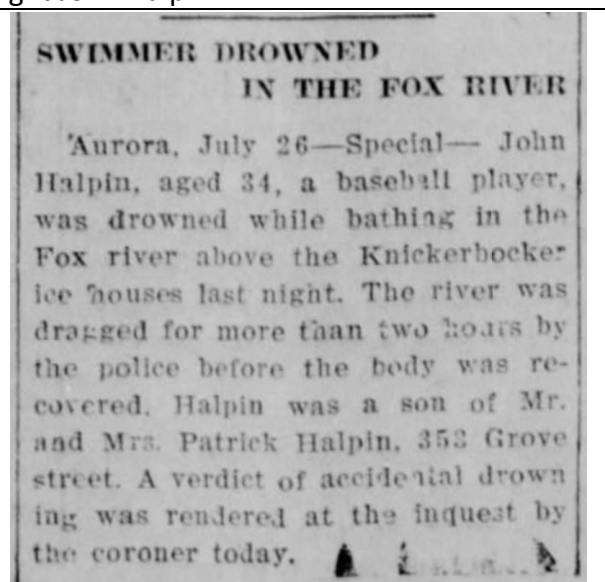
