Burlington Free Press May 10, 1889

Accused of Burglary.

William Hanrahan and William Fagan, baseball players, who, it will be remembered, were at one time connected with a Glens Falls nine, have been arrested at Lansingburgh on the charge of burglary. Anthony Schlesler says that the young men effected an entrance into his place of business in that village last January. The prisoners were arraigned, waived examination and gave bail to appear before the grand jury. Fagan has signed with the Hartford club for the coming season, and Hanrahan was engaged to play with Sioux City club of the Northwestern league. They protest that they are innocent of the charge preferred against them.

HANRAHAN LEAVES FOR HOME.

NO PLACE FOR HIM ON THE BROOKLYN TEAM.

Allaire, N.J., March 30.—It was showery and chilly here yesterday afternoon, and Manager Barnie decided not to play a practice game. The full team labored with grounders and sky-scrapers, and batted in a general mixed order for a couple of hours. "Red" Hanrahan left the team to-day and went home to Binghamton, N. Y. There was no show for him on the Brooklyn Club, since it was decided to play Jones at short. Barnie is well fixed for infielders; Hanrahan worked well in practice, and the Brooklyn management has promised to take care of him.

Omaha had the same star team again—Lovett and Wilson, the best battery in the league; Billy Burdick, Jimmy Cooney, the midget shortstop; Chippy McGarr and Burns, Flynn and Shannon. Des Moines started out with Charley Cushman doing its big twirling. Billy Alvord, Bug Holliday, Traffley, MacCullar and Van Dyke were other stars. The Chicago Maroons had Eddle Hengle at second and Red Hanrahan, the little pepper-box, at short, with Long in centerfield, Dugdale behind the bat and Gus Krock and Frank Dwyer in the box. Kansas City had Campau, Manning, Swartzel, Reynolds, Cartwright, Conway and Inghols, all great players. Milwaukee had old Joe Strauss, and a crowd now almost forgotten. St. Louis had Crooks, Hines, Nichols, Staley, Beckley and Nyce.

Our old friend, Jim Molloy, of Lansingburg, an authority on sports, sends in a letter on old baseball stars which will be interesting to fans in this area.

Here is the letter:

The late James (Toby) Devlin of Lansingburg was a pitcher for the St. Louis Browns in the years of 1881, '82, '83, '84 and '85. Devlin, a southpaw, who stood five feet 9½ in height and weighed about 160 pounds, also pitched for Albany in 1891, '92, '93 and '94.

He got his start on the Old Village Green, now 112th Street playground.

Many other young stars got their start on the Village Green.

Among these were William (Dash) Fagan, who pitched for Kansas City; Charles Briody, who was a catcher for Detroit when Detroit was in the National League; William (Red) Hanrahan, who played shortstop for Albany for many years; Ossie Peartree, a nephew of Red Hanrahan, who played shortstop for Troy in the State League; William (Whaler)

I have heard of similar romances, such as the scandalous affair an old Binghamtonian named Red Hanrahan, who lived over on Pine Street, carried on with the Times until he died.

If he didn't read it one day, that day was lost. He was a retired professional baseball player who has left us downtown Binghamtonians a great legacy, to wit: The day doesn't start right if you can't pick the Times up at 6:30 a. m. at the J. J. Fruit Market at Front and Main Streets.
