

Humboldt, Io., Aug. 24.—Special: The best game of ball played here this season came off yesterday between Lake Mills and Humboldt, resulting in a victory for the latter club. Score:

Harkness and Harrington are the battery which did such fine work for Danville, Ill., earlier in the season, Harkness being the one signed by Sioux City after Danville disbanded. But he is a Humboldt boy, having lived here nearly twenty years, and this being now his home. Lake Mills claims to be the champion club of northern Iowa.

Sioux City Journal March 9, 1890

Ray Harkness, the Humboldt professonal base ballist, has joined the Minneapolis club, as we learn from the Kosmos. Harkness has played with Creston, Los Angeles and Ft. Dodge. He began his professional career in 1887, when he won 26 consective games and pitched his club into the championship of the southwestern league. He pitched for the Danvilles in 1889 in the inter-state league.

Harkness Released.

Ray Harkness was released yesterday morning by the Minneapolis management. He was not let go because of his inability to pitch good ball, but because the team is amply provided with good pitching material now that Shreve has proved himself worthy of confidence, so Harkness was given his release. The young fellow pitched some remarkably fine games early in the season, and will prove a good man for any team that is short in pitching material. He speaks of going to California.

St. Paul Globe June 7, 1890

Ray P. Harkness is now at his home in Humboldt where he is resting up after his recent illness, and when he recovers fully, will accept either one of two offers that he has to play ball, one at Denver with the Western Association club and the other in New Haven, Connecticut, with the New Haven Atlantic league club. In the meantime an effort is being made to arrange a game to be played between this city and Humboldt, with Harkness in the box for the visitors.—Fort Dodge Chronicle.

Humboldt (Iowa) Independent June 26, 1890

Ray Harkness, the Eumboldt base ballist, has signed for the coming season with the Evansville, Ind., base ball club, and expects to help that club win the pennant in the inter-state league. He says that the practice and exercise he has received this winter at Minneapolis has placed him in better form for the labor of his position than he has ever been before. Harkness is now spending a few days at Humboldt preparatory to leaving for the scene of battle.

BUTTE, April 14.-Wilson, the catcher. and Ray Harkness, the pitcher, were both signed this morning, and the Butte club is now decidedly "in it." Harkness is one of the best minor league pitchers in the country, and will keep the heavy hitters of the opposing teams guessing as soon as he gets'down to work. He won the pennant for Evansville in the Indiana state league last year by his great work in the box, and he finished the season with Cincinnati. While with the latter team he held the St. Louis sluggers down to eight hits in a game which he won from them. Wilson is as good a man behind the bat as Harkness is in the box, and they are both sure to do great work for Butte be-



APPENDICITIS OPERATION.

Harkness, the Park City Ball Player, the Sufferer,

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Park City, June 22.—Rha Byron Harkness, familiarly known as "Old Hoss," Park City's famous ball tosser, is very—perhaps dangerously—ill with appendicitis. He complained of feeling unwell the past few days, and although he pitched a good game Sunday, he was not feeling right, but did not think his illness of any consequence. Last evening at about 10 o'clock he was suddenly attacked with severe pains in the abdomen, and the pain grew more intense. A physician was called, and after an examination pronounced the case to be appendicitis, and he feared it was quite far advanced. The patient was put under the influence of opiates to relieve the pains and was given the usual local treatment. He did not recover consciousness until 1 o'clock today, and then he was able to talk but little.




JACK HARKNESS PASSES AWAY IN BAKERSFIELD
