



Manager and Men.

The Sporting News of St. Louis has the following concerning Frank Bandle and the men recently engaged by him in St. Louis for the Omaha team: "I met Stub Bandle, the manager of the new Omaha club, on Thursday. He was in St. Louis looking for players. He has signed several good men for next year, notably, John C. Healy, Dick Dwyer, Frank Crowning, T. H. Goodell, Frank Jenins, John Messitt and Martin Brimblecorn. Healy is well known as the crack pitcher of the Peach Pie team. He pitches as Charley Sweeney used to when he was the crack pitcher of the country. Goodell has long been Healy's catcher and is well known as the crack of all the back stops. Jenins is also from the Peach Pie team and will play at short field. Messitt is from Oneida, N.

St. Louis Globe-Democrat December 24, 1886

A letter was received yesterday from Manager Solco, stating that he had signed Flynn, of last season's Chicago league team. Flynn is to be paid the snug little sum of \$2,400 for his next year's work in the box. He is also one of the best fielders in America today and his batting record and ability is far above the average. He is looked upon as a great acquisition to the team. The signing of Flynn as the third pitcher for the Omaha team will let out Healy; "Happy Jack" will probably sign with some one in the American association and the old Gate City favorite will not be seen on the Omaha diamond for next season at least.

Omaha World Herald January 2, 1888

It is quite probable that the Omaha lovers of the national game will see "Happy Jack" Healy on the local diamond again. He has not signed yet, although several cities want him. He has stated his terms for the season, which are satisfactory to the Omaha management and will be accepted. It is said that he has improved much during the past winter and gives more promise than ever of developing into a great pitcher.
