Old-time Player Here. There is a man in town who has been shaking hands with everybody ever since he arrived, who recalls the first

really fast baseball team that was ever played in British Columbia. He is Mr. Joseph McCrum of Kamloops, a railway conductor on the C. P. R. just now, who is down for his holidays.

Mr. McCrum was a_member of that famous Kamloops baseball team that the people in the inland capital brought to British Columbia in 1890 or thereabouts, and played about as fast a shortstop game as is put up anywhere even now. Joe, too, could go some behind the bat, and was an exceptionally fast man on the bases. Kamloops got baseball mad one year, and held a tournament. Donald entered and imported Frank March, the afterward famous pitcher for Tacoma, and then umpire, to help out. March came to Kamloops, but the Amities of Victoria beat Donald out, principally because there was no one to hold March. The next year Kamloops had March, and with March was practically the whole of a semi-professional team from Mineapolis, called the Lyndales, after Lyndale avenue in that city, where the players lived. Charles H. Watson, afplayers lived. Charles H. Watson, afterward leader of the band in Westminster, was catcher; Schoonmaker first baseman; Hank Hearn played on second; Jack Herchimer on third; Me-Crum held things down at short, succeeding Chesley, who had played the year before. Armstrong was in the field, with two others who were as good as the rest. The Kamloops team came to Vancouver for a First of July celebration, and defeated the Amities by 14 to 1, and that lonely run that Victoria got was obtained by Fred. Jackson of Victoria batting a little fly into the crowd where the fielders could not reach it. The upcountry team continued its tour, and defeated everything it went against. With Herchimer and McCrum as battery Port Townsend was sent down the line for 3 to 2. The next day, with all kinds of money bet on the result, Port Townsend got it rubbed in harder to the tune of 6 to 0. Victoria was again defeated on the return trip, and the tour ended because there was not a team on the coast left that would take a chance against the visitors.


