—The Dubuque base-ball team that will contest for the pennant in the Interstate League this season was chosen to-day as follows: First base, George A. Derker, Los Angeles, Cal.; second base, Max Suhr, Monticelle, Iowa; short step, Arthur L. Richardson, Hamilton, Canada; Third base, Frank Cariin, Chicago; pitchers, H. J. Burrell, Bethel, Vt.; Edward Keas, Dubuque; Clyde McVickers, Guthrie Center; Frank Wolf, Brownsville, Minn.; catchers, George B. Hupp, Des Moines; C. E. Jones, Kansas City. The pitchers and catchers will change to the field. The team leaves here Monday to play three games at Fort Dodge, one at Clarksville Thursday, one at Waterloo Friday, and one at Independence Saturday, and will return Saturday evening, and remain until Wednesday, when they will go to Ottawa, Ill., to open the season there May 1. The uniforms were given out today, and are quite attractive, being in bluish gray trimmed with red.

Des Moines Register Dec 3, 1896

George B. Hupp is a new candidate in the field for city electrician. He has the endorsement of many of the large labor bodies of the city. N. Rosseau has withdrawn from the contest and will remove from the city. Mr. Hupp has been engaged in the electrical craft here for thirteen years, and is fully competent for the position he seeks. He has the endorsement of all the houses for whom he has done work as a capable man, who understands the business.

Des Moines Register April 12, 1901

No action has yet been taken by the city council in regard to the resignation of George B. Hupp as city electrical inspector, but it is expected that the resignation will be officially acted upon and steps taken toward preparing for the appointment of a successor within a short time.

Mr. Hupp's resignation does not take effect until the expiration of his regular term of office on March 31, but the ordinance which requires that a competitive examination of applicants shall be held prior to the making of the appointment, necessitates action before that date.

Mr. Hupp's grandfather, George B. Hupp, was born in Jeffron, Pennsylvania, and died in Cedar Rapids. He was the first city electrician in Des Moines. He moved to Cedar Rapids, where he became president of the first electrical union there, Local No. 5. He was also a member of the Ancient Order of United Workmen and the Modern Woodmen of America. He married Mary Galligher, a native of Iowa, who died in Rockwell. William Forrest Hupp, father of the subject of this sketch, was born in Des Moines, April 8, 1889, and died in Cedar Rapids, October 14, 1938. He also was an electrician by trade. His first employment was with the Quaker Oats Company of Cedar Rapids, as electrician for two years. In 1912 he organized the Electric Motors Company at 219 First Avenue, Southwest, where he was in business until his death, at which time he was sole owner of the firm. At one time he was also president of the Cold Storage Locker Company of Cedar Rapids. He was a Demo-
