Old-time Player Here.
 There is a man in town who has been shaking hands with everybody ever since he arrived, who recalls the first really fast baseball team that was ever played in British Columbia. He is Mr. Joseph McCrum of Kamloops, a railway conductor on the C. P. R., just now, who is down for his holidays.
 Mr. McCrum was a member of that famous Kamloops baseball team that the people in the inland capital brought to British Columbia in 1890 or thereabouts, and played about as fast a shortstop game as is put up anywhere even now. Joe, too, could go some behind the bat, and was an exceptionally fast man on the bases. Kamloops got baseball mad one year, and held a tournament. Donald entered and imported Frank March, the afterward famous pitcher for Tacoma, and then umpire, to help out. March came to Kamloops, but the Amities of Victoria beat Donald out, principally because there was no one to hold March. The next year Kamloops had March, and with March was practically the whole of a semi-professional team from Minneapolis, called the Lyndales, after Lyndale avenue in that city, where the players lived. Charles H. Watson, af-

players lived. Charles H. Watson, afterward leader of the band in Westminster, was catcher; Schoonmaker first baseman; Hank Hearn played on second; Jack Herchmer on third; McCrum held things down at short, succeeding Chesley, who had played the year before. Armstrong was in the field, with two others who were as good as the rest. The Kamloops team came to Vancouver for a First of July celebration, and defeated the Amities by 14 to 1, and that lonely run that Victoria got was obtained by Fred Jackson of Victoria batting a little fly into the crowd where the fielders could not reach it. The upcountry team continued its tour, and defeated everything it went against. With Herchmer and McCrum as battery Port Townsend was sent down the line for 3 to 2. The next day, with all kinds of money bet on the result, Port Townsend got it rubbed in harder to the tune of 6 to 0. Victoria was again defeated on the return trip, and the tour ended because there was not a team on the coast left that would take a chance against the visitors.
 Mr. McCrum is a prominent Knight of Pythias, and used to be famous as an all-round athlete and step-dancer.

A representative of the **SENTINEL** on inquiring of Mr. C. H. Watson what the prospects were for the coming season, received the brusque reply: "We're going to have a little bit the gayest, swiftest team that ever played in this part of the country, and just tell them that the 'Old man' said so. I tell you March is pitching stronger than he ever did before, and now that I have taken on a little more adipose tissue I think I can stand the exercise," etc.

Joseph McCrum, Pioneer, Dies at 82
 Came Here in 1889 With Famed "Imported" Baseball Team.

Joseph McCrum who came here in 1889 to play baseball and stayed to marry and become one of the city's senior citizens, died Monday afternoon less than 24 hours after he had entered Royal Inland Hospital for treatment. He was in his 82nd year.

Funeral services will be held in Lacey's Funeral Home on Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Rev. John McCurt will officiate. Interment will be in family plot, Pleasant street cemetery.

The late Mr. McCrum is survived by his widow, the former Annie King whom he married on May 20, 1891, in the then Presbyterian church on Seymour street, a structure now incorporated in Calvary.

Old Ball Player, Joe McCrum, Dies

KAMLOOPS, Dec. 19.—Funeral services for Joe McCrum, 82, resident here for 57 years, were held today.

Mr. McCrum, who died Monday, came here in 1889 to play baseball on a semi-pro team, formed to publicize the City of Kamloops. Coming from Minneapolis with the rest of the team, he decided to stay with six other team-mates who formed one of Kamloops greatest ball teams in the 1890's.

He leaves one daughter, Mrs. G. R. Nimmons, of Vancouver.
