It is also probable that the board of directors will be entarged, and other steps taken to awaken the general interest of the members. The club house, at 520 Hennepin avenue, is one of the best furnished and equipped establishments of its kind in the country, with a splendid gymnasium. It has been quite prosperous thus far, and there is no reason why it should not continue to be.

Sam G. Morton, manager of the Minneapolis team, will undoubtedly make a success of base ball at the Flour City this year if it is a possibility—if expe-



rience and keen judgment are the qualications necessary. Mr. Morton is and has been a base ball manager both as a matter of love and business for years. He has been the leading light of the Western association since its organization, and has conducted a base ball bureau at Chicago for years. He has been intimately associated with A. G. Spalding for a long time, and those who know the two say the success of the Chicago team has been due in a measure to Morton's ability to pick out good material. His location in Minneapolis as Spalding's agent is an indication that A. G. has his eye fixed on the time when the Twin Cities will enter the National league, and Morton has squatted, as it were, to pre-empt the franchise. He has already done one thing that is a correct move in the direction of making base ball pay in minneapolis, and that is to secure grounds in a central location. Personally Mr. Morton is decidedly agreeable, although he is said to have a disagreeable way of calling attention to the fact when his men don't play ball to suit him.
