At the meeting last night the team was organized for the year. Elmer Foster, after whom the team was named, was made an honorary member, and if he does not play professional ball this season, will play with the team on several occasions. George Lennon, formerly of the Palace team, was elected manager, and Charles De Leur secretary and treasurer. Games will be arranged with all amateur teams in the state as soon as possible. The first appearance of the Fosters will be made on next Tuesday and Wednesday at Athletic park, when they meet the Millers.
