
## **Fred Nyce**


Fred Nyce played for various team in Pennsylvania and Ohio in 1887, starting with the club in Reading, PA. When that team disbanded in July, he joined the team in Columbus, OH. The Sun (New York) reports that Von der Ahe signed Nyce and Pete Sommers on December 10, 1887, along with returning catcher Jack Boyce, while on a trip to the east coast to attend Association meetings. (Von der Ahe also traded several players from the core of the 1887 Browns during this trip in a series of deals that effectively dismantled his three-peat championship club.) Nyce was signed to pitch for the Browns, but he ended up with the Whites very quickly in Spring Training.

On the Whites' Spring Training road trip, Nyce pitched in a three-man rotation with Staley and Sommers until the final game of the trip, when he played in the outfield. He played center field on May 1 in the second game of the season, and then moved to the mound for his first start of the season on May 10. The St. Louis Republican reports "Nyce, who is still suffering from a sore arm, was put in to pitch for the Whites, and his delivery was wild and erratic." After this start, Nyce and Staley were the only starters for the remainder of the season (save two games in late May).

After the Whites disbanded, Nyce headed back east, where he signed on with Hamilton of the International Association. He played with Burlington of the Central Interstate League in 1889, and then Dallas in the Texas League in 1890. With Dallas he is credited with a 1-6 record, but an ERA of 1.69 in 8 games (52 innings). There is no other record for Fred Nyce in professional baseball after 1890.

Numerous other reports that he joined the Dallas team in January/February of 1890.

"Fred Nyce, the crack pitcher of the Hudson River League, has joined the Dallas (Tex) team." St. Paul Globe March 30, 1890

Nyce was pounded in a loss to Houston, in which he shifted to 2b during the game. – Fort Worth Daily Gazette April 12, 1890

Nyce umpired a game between Dallas and Fort Worth. (No league umpires were available.) – Fort Worth Daily Gazette April 4, 1890

Nyce lost to Galveston 6-0 on April 15, 1890.

Lost to Galveston 7-1 on May 4, 1890. Won a game against the Panthers on May 12, 1890. Lost a game against Waco on May 16, 1890. Lost to Austin on May 21, 1890. There were rumors the Dallas team would fold in the article on the May 21 game.

This is the next mention of Fred Nyce after the loss on May 21, 1890:

"Nyce" appears in the box score playing 3b for the Keystone against Doyletown in the Philadelphia Enquirer July 13, 1890. No first name given. He appears again on July 20, 1890, per the Times of Philadelphia. There is a "Nyce" playing right field for the ACSN team on August 24, 1890 (The Times), and again on August 29, 1890.

The game was advertised to commence at three o'clock, but owing to some delay, play was not called until 3:45, with the Delawares at the bat. The first striker, Goodfellow, led off with a base hit, stole second, and through errors on the part of the Sports finally managed to score. next three batters were easily disposed of. When the Delawares opened play Nyce was put in to pitch and gave the first two batsmen their bases by hitting them with the ball. Through wretched fielding on the part of the Delawares they scored three runs, without a hit being made. In the second inning Nyce did no better, giving two more batters their bases by hitting them. Although but one base hit was made they scored four runs, thus making a total of seven in the first two innings. third inning the Delawares substituted Nolan for Nyce, and but six runs were scored off his able delivery during the remainder of the game. The game was very exciting. throughout, and some exceptionally fine






