

The Best Short Fleid Player of the Western League Signs with Davenport-Ira Phillips and His Record-The Bloomington Meeting.

Upon his return from the Bloomington convention Manager Lucas found awaiting him the contract with Ira Phillips' signature. There is a little history connected with Phillips. Two years ago when Manager Lucas organized the Northwestern league club in Duluth, he tried hard to secure this player, who the season of '85 had given promise of becoming a great third-baseman, while playing in the Portland, Me., New England league team, but as the Northwestern league had a certain salary limit, Phillips and the Duluth manager could not come to terms. Phillips then signed to play third for the Denver team of the Western league, where during the season of '86 he gave entire satisfaction. Manager Lucas kept his eye on Phillips and decided to have him in his Duluth team of 87 if

By the time Duluth got in shape to do business for the season of '87 nearly

thorough gentleman. The fact that he played two consecutive seasons on the Denver team is certainly sufficient evidence that he is all that he is represented to be. He is a steady, sober fellow, and well liked by all who know him. His home is in Hartland, O., but at present resides in Denver.

The only members of the Davenport-base ball club left in the city are Manager Lucas and Ira Phillips. Phillips is almost sick, and has been ever since he was hit with the ball in Peoria. Harrington left for his home in Keokuk this morning on the Pittsburgh, and Meyer left for Marshall, Ill., his home, this afternoon.

Ira Phillips, Davenport's first short stop, left for his home near Norwalk, Ohio, last evening. He has been disabled ever since his accident in Peoria, and will not play ball any more this year.



Davenport Daily Leader May 5, 1895


Ira Phillips, who left for his home in Ohio Monday, was hit on the head by a pitched ball at Decorah and knocked senseless. Blood gushed out of his mouth and ears and he has been deaf ever since. The surgeon who attended him at Decorah warned him not to play ball again this season even for one hundred dollars a minute and it is feared serious consequences may yet result.
