He is a large, fine looking man with a perfect physique, not unlike Fred Newman in personal appearance, is 5'9" in height and 25 years of age. He is the heaviest man in the club weighing 190 pounds. This is his third season as a professional ball player having played in Leavenworth in '86 and with the Champain (sic) Clippers in '87. Kewanee, Ill is his home where he teaches school in the winter time. He is quiet in his demeanor and is not disposed to talk a great deal but when he says that a man can't drink whisky and play ball at the same time, he means, it. He will have sober, honest ball players around him or none at all and the people may rest assured that no Jerry O'Brien kind of a man will be tolerated.

The Clippers club has been reorganized by replacing five of the members. David Sowden, the left-anded pitcher of the national feague club at Indianapolis; Newman, catcher, and John Sowden, also of Indianapolis; C. U. Smith, late catcher for the Wichita, Kansas, club; and Snyder, "the slugger," from Kewaunee, are the new acquisitions. The management of the Clippers have left nothing undone to secure first-class players, and they feel confident that they now have one of the best nines in the state.

Champaign Daily Gazette July 1, 1887

On Wednesday, Snyder was playing first-base. A wild ball was thrown by Dave Sowders, and Snyder jumped to get it. There was a fearful rip, and the big first-baseman felt himself going to pieces. He laid down on the ground, and the nine gathered around to find out what had killed him. In a whisper he informed them of his sad predicament. A new pair of unmentionables were procured, and the friendly nines gathered around to hide his blushes while the exchange was made.


Base-Ball Notes.




MRS. GRACE M. SNYDER DIES



"BARNEY" SNYDER, BASE BALL CATCHER, DEAD IN CHICAGO

Belvidere baseball fans, who have seen B. Frank Snyder of Rockford work behind the bat in many a hard fought game, will be sorry to learn of his death, which occurred Wednesday at his home in Chicago. He had suffered for three months from liver trouble.

Snyder was 54 years old and moved to Chicago after he had finished his baseball career about 15 years ago. He played in several of the minor leagues, but never made the majors although he was touted as an unusually good backstop. He passed most of his baseball career as a member of the Rockford professional team, but caught occasionally for a Belvidere team in off seasons.
