

Manager Gooding, of the Minneapolis base ball team, has just signed three new men. C. J. Parsons, pitcher of the Rochester, N. N., team last year, is the first of the trio. He has also signed J. O. Sterling of Detroit, a very promising amateur twirler. The third man is W. F. Jordan, who caught for Duluth toward the close of last season. He is said to be much such a player as Earle, of the same team. Jordon is a fine all around player, as well as a brilliant catcher.

Oshkosh Northwestern Jan 20, 1888

Manager Gooding now has four good pitchers, three first class catchers and a crack short stop. The newly acquired petcher is C. J. Parsons, who played in the International league last season with the Rochester club, and was considered one of the best pitchers in the league. He has also signed J. O. Sterling, a young giant of Detroit, who stands six feet and weighs 190 pounds, and who promises to develop into something phenomenal as a pitcher. W. F. Jordan has been signed as catcher. He played with the Duluth club a short time last season and is noted as being very fine. He is a heavy batter, a good runner and excellent at backstops and throwing to bases. Chub Collins, of last year's Hamilton club, in the National league, is also liable to be awarded to Minneapolis, and if so, everything will be complete. With so well equipped a club there is no reason why, if only they won't get discouraged as they did a few times last summer, they cannot win the pennant.

player, and from the reports of this Detroit
boy there is no fear of his "going through."
He is a veritable giant in stature and as
handsome as he is big. He is 24 years of
age, six feet in height and tips the beam at
180 pounds. Stirling has pitched for the
Cass club of Detroit, which has held the amateur championship of Michigan for four
years, all with his help, and it is hoped that
his career as a professional may be as full
of flowers as was his career as an amateur.

James Stirling died at his residence, 117 Lafayette avenue. Thursday, and will be buried this afternoon. He was a member of the old Cass Base Ball Club when it was the great amateur team of Detroit, and later went into professional base ball. He played with the Minneapolis Club, in the Northwestern League, for several seasons, as well as with clubs in other cities. He was but little over 30 years of age.

The funeral of the late John Sterling will take place to-morrow afternoon from his late residence on Jersey avenue, and many friends of the deceased and members of the Gloucester Democratic Club will attend in a body. 

A man named **Sterling** is one of four amateur players who made their only major league appearance for the Philadelphia Athletics of the American Association on October 12, 1890 against the Syracuse Stars. It was the last game of the season, and was played in Gloucester, NJ. Early researchers confused this Sterling with a *John Sterling*, who was a minor league player at the time, but it is very unlikely that the two were the same man. In fact, it is likely that this Sterling was not even named John, as the only other detail known about him is that he was from Camden, NJ. In spite of that, he was wrongly been listed in encyclopedias as "John" Sterling for over 100 years. His three mysterious teammates for that day are Ham Sweigert, John McBride and Bob Stafford.

The visitors took kindly to the curves of Sterling, a young man of Camden, who was arrayed in a black cloth suit, with low cut yest and white stand-up collar, and before they had finished with him the Jerseyman's spirits were as wilted as his collar. John Sterling, the young pitcher whom St. Louis is holding pending trial, complains that Brunell did him an injustice. Stering went no further than Baltimore with the Browns. He was there taken sick and came back to Philadelphia, where he now is awaiting Comiskey's orders, consequently he could not have been tried in Oleve'and and released. Sterling also says that neither Boylo or Milligan spoke disparagingly of his ability, but that, on the contrary, both are pleased with him, and that the only reason why he has not yet received a initial is because just now the race is too close, and there is no "pudding" in the Association this year to try new men on.
