



There are but few ball players in the west as well known and as well liked as Tom Turner with his home run tendencies. Last year he captained the Wheeling, W. Va., team in the interstate league and landed his colors in second place. He will hold down the initial bag for the home team this season.

A portly man of 60 breezed into Frank (Dope) Smith's cigar store Thursday night and greeted the mer. chant with an expansive grin.

"I get your face, but not your name," replied the big tobacconist.

"Turner-" the visitor began, when Smith broke in with, "Sure, you're old Tom Turner, center fielder on the Spokane ball club in '91."

And so he was. For 15 minutes the air was agitated with reminiscences of the days, 35 years ago, when John S. Barnes bossed the famous Spokane baseball club. Turner explained that he was en route from his home in Aberdeen, Wash., to Butte and had stopped off just to see how many of the old-timers he knew here more than a third of a century ago were left.
